BHK Child Development Board continues to be one of the only local agencies offering preschool opportunities to our local families. Our preschool teachers and primary caregivers are some of the most highly trained and qualified early childhood professionals in the region.

Some highlights of the 2017-18 school year are outlined below:

- A new collaboration with the Upper Great Lakes Family Health Center resulted in nearly 100% of our Head Start children receiving preventive dental care, an 11% increase from the previous year.
- Our financial audit was completed without findings.
- There was a 22% increase in parent engagement from the previous year.
- We added three new preschool classrooms at two of our local school districts.
- Funding from Michigan's Great Start to Quality Race to the Top Initiative is being used to improve BHK playgrounds and classroom learning environments.


FEDERAL MONITORING

The aligned monitoring system of Head Start measures the quality and accountability of the Head Start programs across the country. In fall 2017, BHK entered a fifth year of a five-year grant cycle and has completed all review events that occur including health and safety, eligibility, enrollment, attendance, fiscal, program governance, school readiness and comprehensive services, and CLASS environmental rating. BHK is in full compliance with program requirements and standards of quality.

FINANCIALS


REVENUES An estimated 92% of our total revenue was from public sources in 2017-18, which is consistent with previous years (94% in 2016-17). This includes a **7.6% increase in Head Start funding from the previous fiscal year.**



EXPENDITURES During the 2017-18 fiscal year we saw a 16.2% reduction in expenditures. This was partly due to a loss of 21st Century Community Learning Centers (Great Explorations) funding (a total decrease of \$595,982), but also due to a change in medical benefit costs. In 2018 we transferred our employee prescription coverage from BCBS to 44 North, resulting in an estimated expenditure savings of \$70,000 annually.

2016-17 AUDITED BUDGET




BY THE NUMBERS

ENROLLMENT

We strive to serve the greatest number of families possible.

During the 2017-18 school year, the BHK Early Head Start (EHS) and Head Start (HS) classrooms had an average of 97% enrollment. A total of 402 families were served through these programs.



We serve the children who need the most support first.

At the time of enrollment in 2017, 35% of enrolled children were from families whose income was below 100% of the federal poverty level (FPL). An additional 27% were on public assistance such as TANF or SSI. Enrollment data includes pregnant mothers (n=436).




We aim to give children a head start in life.

We provide a healthy, nurturing environment for infants and toddlers, and offer rich, supportive learning experiences for preschool aged children.



We prepare children to succeed.

Focusing our efforts on eligible children from birth to five years of age, we strive to give them a head start in life. Our classrooms are staffed by qualified teachers who continuously monitor children through evidence-based observational assessments. Results of these assessments are used to individualize our approach with each child. Children in our home-based program are visited by degreed staff, who support parents in providing a stimulating learning environment at home. Weekly playgroups in multiple locations allow networking and interaction between both children and parents.



Partnership with the Upper Great Lakes Family Health Center in-school dental program provided all enrolled Head Start children access to dental care, resulting in an 11% increase in HS children receiving preventative care. 94% of enrolled children up-to-date on immunizations; 96% up-to-date on preventative & primary health care.



15%, or 1 out of every 6 preschool children had an individualized education plan, and were eligible for special education services.



We provide support to families that need it. Five of 11 BHK families, or nearly 50%, are single-parent families.




BHK-provided family support services include 1) emergency/crisis intervention, 2) housing assistance, 3) mental health services, 4) child abuse/neglect services, 5) assistance to incarcerated individuals, 6) adult education, 7) substance abuse prevention, 8) domestic violence services, 9) Relationship/marriage education, 10) Asset building. Nearly all families received health (98%) and parenting (96%) education (n=403).



We expand learning opportunities for students.

BHK continues to serve students beyond preschool through the Great Explorations program (GE). We offer out-of-school time activities for children in grades K-8 that are aimed at increasing access to STEM activities, providing homework support, and getting students outside and active.

GE partners with the MI Science Center each summer to hold a Science Festival for students. This year's theme was Sound and our eight partnering GE schools brought 188 students to the event. Three Family Engagement nights were held throughout the school year at three different schools; all familes are invited, and as many as 150 people have attended.
